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## The 10 sordid sex sessions

THE full lurid details of Bill Clinton's sexual encounters with Monica Lewinsky are revealed in the Starr report.

It gives a full account of the sordid White House frolics between the President and an employee less than half his age, and confirms for the first time that semen on one of her dresses was Clinton's beyond all reasonable doubt.

The special prosecutor argued that it was necessary to go into such detail to show that Mr Clinton lied in his sworn evidence in the Paula Jones sex-

ual harassment case. The report said that according to Ms Lewinsky, she and the President had 10 sexual encounters — eight while she worked at the White House and two after she left.

The sexual encounters generally occurred in or near the President's private study off the Oval Office — usually in a windowless hallway outside the study.

Ms Lewinsky described one sexual encounter with the President in the White House on

January 21, 1996. She said they had had "phone sex" for the first time the previous week and she was not sure whether he had liked it.

"They continued talking as they went to the hallway by the study. Then, with Ms Lewinsky in mid-sentence, 'he just started kissing me,'" the report said.

"He lifted her top and touched her breasts with his hands and mouth. According to Ms Lewinsky, the President 'unzipped his pants and sort of exposed himself, and she per-

# City wants religious to sell excess land

City councillors want religious authorities to sell excess land to Dublin Corporation so that more social housing can be built.

Already both the Dublin diocese and the Christian Brothers have said that they are involved in projects which have been set up to raise funds from land sales in the city.

Spokesman for the Christian Brothers said the organisation had raised funds in the past and re-invested the proceeds in such projects as the rehabilitation of AIDS

victims and their families and youth training projects.

He pointed out that the Brothers had also sold some land in Marino which was subsequently used for house building.

A £2m trust fund for social projects has also been set up by the brothers, the spokesman added.

Father John Dardis, spokesman for the Dublin archdiocese, said that the religious orders and authorities

were very much aware of the housing crisis, and had previously made land available for housing.

A motion calling on the religious to take this action was tabled by the chairman of the Housing Committee, Cllr Eamonn O'Brien (Lab).

Cllr O'Brien called on all Dublin religious authorities to review their land banks and to enter negotiations with Dublin Corporation for the disposal of excess land for the construction of affordable social housing.

Supporting the motion, Cllr Eric Byrne (DL) said: "Religious authorities are entitled to make a profit on

lands they sell but they also have a commitment to the poor of this city."

However, both Ald Noel Ahern TD and Ald Sean Haughey TD pointed out that many social projects around the city owed their existence to religious orders.

"I don't agree with this motion if it targets religious orders alone. What about CIE, the VECs, the Docks Board and the Department of Agriculture? They all have lands too," said Ald Ahern.

Cllr Ahern voted against the motion, which was passed by a majority of members.

## He biked half the globe for his pint

YASAYUKI Ozeki finally made it to the heart of auld Dublin and the home of the world's most famous creamy stout after crossing some of the world's most hostile terrain during his five month and 7,500 mile cycle.

Since departing from Osaka, Japan, on April 16, Yasuyuki conquered the Gobi Desert, the Ural mountains, the entire continent of Europe before reaching his holy grail at the Guinness Hop Store and reuniting with his Danish girlfriend, Maria Tsalapatis.

Yasuyuki set his mind on the "Pedal Power to Ireland" dream during a visit here in 1996.

To mark his achievement, Yasayuki was presented with two leaves of gold in the shape of New Stand tickets for tomorrow's Guinness All-Ireland hurling final.

## FG activist to sue State over secrets leak probe

FINE Gael activist Tommy Morris, whose interrogation under the Official Secrets Act caused the biggest political row of last year's Presidential election campaign, is suing the State.

A High Court action will focus on how his 12 hours of questioning by gardai became a huge media event on the eve of the election.

His solicitor, Paul Marren was away from his Dublin office yesterday but friends of Mr Morris confirmed that legal proceedings were in train.

Mr Morris, a married social worker with two children, was an adviser to Minister of State for Foreign Affairs Gay Mitchell in the first six months of the Rainbow Coalition.

He was taken by gardai to Lucan Station during an inquiry into the leaking of confidential Department of Foreign

Affairs memoranda. These documents analysed how the eventually victorious candidate Mary McAleese viewed Sinn Fein.

Within two hours of his arrival at Lucan, his "arrest" was dominating election coverage in newspapers, radio and TV. That was two days before the State's 2.6m voters went to the polls in what amounted to a battle between Ms McAleese and Fine Gael's nominee Mary Banotti.

Fine Gael leader John Bruton was involved in furious exchanges in the Dail with Taoiseach Bertie Ahern over Fianna Fail claims that a Fine Gael "adviser" had leaked the documents. Amid the controversy, Mary Banotti's chances disappeared.

Mr Morris later denied that he had hand, act or part in any leaking.

Gardai sent a file to Attorney General David Byrne after an investigation that lasted for weeks and were effectively told that it would not merit a prosecution.

## Man jailed for intimidation

A JUDGE said she would not tolerate attacks on foreign nationals in Dublin. Her comments came at the trial of a youth who was jailed for a week for intimidating a Nigerian man during in a shop.

Judge Catherine Murphy was speaking after she heard John Perry (19), with

an address in Dorset Street Flats, Dublin, had been arrested holding a one-metre long piece of wood outside the shop in Dorset Street on March 12 last. Perry had pleaded guilty to having an implement adapted for the purpose of causing injury.

Inside the shop a Nigerian man was afraid to come out because Perry was threatening to hit him with the wood, and other people in the area were also put in fear by Perry's actions.

Perry's solicitor claimed it was the Nigerian who had tried to pick a fight with him.

Judge Murphy said: "Intimidating a foreign national is extremely serious and that sort of behaviour is simply not tolerated in this city."

The court also heard that Perry had already spent a week in custody after failing to turn up on bail after his arrest. Judge Murphy imposed seven days detention.
